

Be prepared for temps ranging from 20 to 80 on this hunt. We won't be far from a vehicle for long periods. You don't need a bunch of special clothing for this hunt. I recommend some sort of layering. I usually wear jeans, polyester base layer on top, fleece jacket and carry another medium weight jacket in my pack.

- License and Conservation Stamp: Don't forget them

- Hunter's Safety Card if born after Jan. 1 1966.

- Blaze orange hat or vest. Must be worn while hunting.

- Binoculars: 8 or 10 power.

- Spotting Scope and Tripod: If you own them you should bring them. If you are flying it isn't always practical so it's up to you. A window mount is good to have also. Your guide will have one.

- Rifle: Minimum caliber is .22 caliber (60 grain bullet or larger), know your bullet drop out to 500 yards. A flat shooting rifle/bullet combo is best. I see a lot of hunters that have not spent enough time at the range and are not proficient with the rifle they bring. Please bring an accurate rifle and know how to use it!! Bring at least 20 rounds with you. Practice shooting prone.

- Leather Gloves: We will be crawling and there is some cactus.

- Knee Pads: They are nice to have on long stalks.

- Daypack: Pretty much any pack will work on this hunt. The Badlands Superday is a great pack for this hunt.

- Rain Jacket: A light packable jacket is recommended.

- Boots: A decent pair of light hikers that are broke in.

- Shooting Sticks or bipod: If you bring them practice with them. Your guide will have shooting sticks. You can also use your pack for a rest.

- Rangefinder: If you have one bring it. Your guide will also have one.

If you have any other questions feel free to call or email. After September 1st, I am in a tent camp on the mountain. I do have cell service at times. Email or text is usually the best way for me to answer questions.
